Matai 5- Whaea Linda

In Matai 5 students have been learning about length measurement. The students estimated the length of different class objects and then measured them in millimeters, centimeters and meters to find the actual length. We then began an investigation using paper planes to trial how different designs may travel different distances. The class had a great time creating and competing against each other.









Rimu 1- Whaea Soonhi

Rimu 1 had the opportunity to test out the 'Human Energy Generator (HEG)' through the School-Gen programme by Genesis Energy. They learnt about the difference between LED lights and regular light bulbs. Rimu 1 learnt that LED lights use less energy and are more cost effective overtime. Ka Rawe Rimu 1!

Rimu 2- Whaea Katinka

Rimu 2 have been learning about Time. They each made their own clock and decorated it any way they liked. They have started the unit by first understanding that one hand on the clock is responsible for telling us the hour and one for telling us the minutes. Below are some pictures of their creations.



Rimu 4- Whaea Jaimee

Rimu 4 have been learning about how animals adapt to their environments and use the special features that they possess to help them survive. Students did a 'rice in a bowl' activity where they had to use either a fork, knife, or spoon (acting as their special feature) to get rice from one area to their bowl (their habitat feeding area). The students could then see how well they adapted to the challenge of the utensil they were using.

Students turned the hand crank to make electricity (using the DC generator inside) to power one of the bulbs at a time.
